Background

- 2016 -The e-GP was launched and rolled out to six (6) pilot sites/Institutions.
- 2018- The system was rolled out to procuring entities in a Phased approach
- 2021- The New Public Procurement Act enacted which made the system mandatory and the Full roll out commenced

Legal Framework

 Public Procurement in Zambia was governed by the Public Procurement Act No. 12 of 2008 which mandated ZPPA to;

organise and mandate systems for the management of procurement data and statistics and information and for the publication of data on public procurement opportunities, contract award and other information of public interest (Section 6 (2) (m))

The Usage of the e-GP was not mandatory.

Legal Framework

- The Public Procurement Act No. 12 of 2008 was repealed by the Public Procurement No. 8 of 2020.
- The new enacted Public Procurement Act in Section 16 (1) makes the use of the electronic government procurement system mandatory for all the government funded/ aided Institutions

CURRENT STATUS/IMPLEMENTATION STRATEGY

- Before a Procuring entity is added to the e-GP, an e-readiness assessment is conducted which checks compliance to the system requirements
- After the Procuring entity has met the requirements, a five (5) days hands on training is scheduled for their members of staff
- The procuring entity is then added to the system for full usage

CURRENT STATUS/IMPLEMENTATION STRATEGY

- In line with the ZPPA Circular No. 4 of 2017, those PE's that have not been trained are required to register on the system for purposes of publishing annual procurement plans, invitation to bids and other related notices.
- The New Public Procurement Act under Section 113 (7) provides for three (3) years in which all procuring entities should comply with the e-GP and other requirements

CURRENT STATUS/IMPLEMENTATION STRATEGY

- Currently 273 Procuring Entities have been registered on the e-GP broken down as follows;
 139 registered for full usage and 134 in line with the ZPPA Circular No. 4 of 2017
- Currently 33,770 supplier organizations have been registered on the system
- The Authority conducts continuous training for both Procuring Entities and Suppliers
- The system is constantly being improved through the documented suggestions from the users

CHALLENGES

- Internet connectivity challenges in some Procuring Entities
- Power outages being experienced in the country due to climate change challenges
- Trained employees turnovers in the Procuring Entities implementing the system
- High cost of maintaining the system and change requests

Challenges

- Integration challenges with other existing systems
- Lack of self learning materials for the users (elearning materials)
- The Authority's limited training budget

OPPORTUNITIES

- Reduce the time and cost of doing business for both bidders and PEs
- Realize better value for money spent through increased competition
- Standardize public procurement processes across govt. departments/agencies
- Allow equal opportunity to all bidders
- Bring transparency (good governance)
- Social economic development
- To make it easy for ZPPA to monitor compliance

OPPORTUNITIES

- Reduction in malpractices in Public Procurement
- Reduced face to face interactions between the players in the procurement process which will result reduced exposure to infectious diseases such as Covid
