Now, requests are processed automatically online, allowing certificates to be generated in PDF format within a maximum of one day.

For its part, the African Public Procurement Network (APPN), through its dynamic secretariat, remains firmly committed to implementing its experience and knowledge-sharing program for 2024. The sessions and webinars among member countries address various current topics.

In conclusion, e-Government procurement is no longer a theory but a reality. The integration of innovation and technology for a radical transformation of the public procurement process is now underway.

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

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
HOW TO VERIFY THE AUTHENTICITY OF DIGITAL REGULATORY FEE PAYMENT CERTIFICATES
